All buglers and trumpeters are welcome to attend the ceremony and perform Taps in Arlington, our nation's most sacred ground.

Buglers will be able to choose where they would like to sound Taps in the cemetery. Registration is free but mandatory for this event. You must be registered to perform.

"BIRTH OF AN AMERICAN TRADITION"

This three-day event will celebrate the birth of America's National Song of Remembrance with Civil War re-enactors depicting the Union Army at rest at Harrison's Landing (on the grounds of the plantation) following the Seven Days Battles in late June 1862. Living history programs will feature the music of fifes, drums, and bugles, including the commemorative sounding of Taps on Saturday night. Concerts by military bands on Friday night and the Federal City Brass Band on Saturday night will add to the musical flavor of the event. The focal point of the weekend will be the re-dedication of the Taps monument on Saturday, June 23, at 11 AM. Taps150 and Bugles Across America will have bugle exhibits set up. In addition Virginia's Civil War HistoryMobile will be on the grounds for visitors over the three days.

All Bugles Across America buglers are invited to participate and perform in concerts during the weekend plus sound Taps on the spot where Taps was born. Ken Rose, LTC (ret), former commander of the Continental Army Band (TRADOC Band), will serve as the conductor of the bugle and trumpet ensembles



State Director Spotlight: Alabama's Gene Ramsay



How long have you been with BAA?

I joined BAA in 2009.

What inspired you to join?

I joined after I read a story about live Taps versus what Veteran's families

were getting. I went to the website and thought I would give it a shot and offer my services. I wanted to serve in the military back when I became eligible, but health conditions kept me from being able. This was my best way to serve and say a humble final "thank you" to those who have fought for my freedoms.

How long have you been playing?

I have been playing trumpet since I was 10 years old.

Best part about the job?

The best part of the job is knowing that the family got the best possible final good bye for their loved one. I also enjoy meeting up with other buglers and talking shop about what we do and why it matters. It's a fraternity for sure.

Best experience with BAA?

I can't say there is any BEST experience, because of the occasion, however, there is a moment that stands out. A local Veteran who was on active duty in Haiti was killed in the earthquakes last year. The entire community was in shock and the funeral was HUGE. Generals from all over were coming to attend and pay tribute to the fallen soldier. I reached out to the funeral director for the service to offer my bugling

service. He checked with the military and they stated that they had a live bugler coming. I was relieved and went about my day knowing that the next day this hero would receive the best possible farewell. The next morning, the hone rang and it was the Air Force OIC of the funeral set up. She was frantic and needed to be sure II could be there because the bugler they had forgot about a prior commitment. Luckily I had nothing scheduled and said yes. I arrived at the Alabama National Cemetery and was astounded by the crowd and the dignitaries present. I can still hear the clicks of the cameras all around me when I began to play after the final rifle volley was echoing off into the distance. As my last note faded, a helicopter rumbled overhead (the Veteran was a helicopter pilot) to complete the moment. Breathtaking and a moment I will never forget.

Do you have a goal for your state?

My goal in Alabama is to draw all the Alabama buglers closer together, to encourage promotion of what we do to local funeral homes and cemeteries and be an even brighter light for all Veterans in Alabama so that they know we all believe as they do...that they deserve the best send off we can provide them when their final moment comes.

What would you like to share with your audience?

Being a part of this organization is an amazing experience and I still get feelings of honor every time I am called to action to provide Taps at a graveside. I never want to lose that. Every emotion I can think of flows through those notes as I am humbled to be able to provide this service to the family of the fallen.

I want to honor this American hero because:

In 2000 Congress passed legislation stating that Veterans had the right to at least two uniformed military personnel to fold the flag and play Taps, at their funeral. If a live bugler was not available, and frequently they were not, Taps was played using a CD recording or a battery-operated bugle with synthesized music. An organization called Bugles Across America was founded to take this legislation a step further to provide a live bugler playing live Taps to recognize with honor the sacrifice that veterans have made for their country. Michael Jackson is the BAA director for the State of Rhode Island. When he first offered to play live Taps for RI Veterans the National Guard was not very welcoming to him, they felt that even though there was a shortage of buglers, only Guardsman should be allowed to play at military funerals. Michael did not let that stop him and he persisted, even helping to write a bill that would allow for live Taps to be played at veteran funerals by honorably discharged veterans. It took a lot of hard work, but it paid off, and in 2004 Michael became the Official State Bugler for the State of Rhode Island and has since sounded the "saddest 24 notes ever written" for over 5000 of his fellow veterans and performed at many other official ceremonies. He performs his duties as a volunteer, in summer's heat and winter's cold, asking for nothing in return except the honor of a final salute to a fellow veteran. In Michael's words "Real War...Real Bullets...Real Bugle". In my words, Michael J. Jackson is a Real Hero, he fought for something he believed in and now gives a final honor to those, who, like himself, have given selflessly to protect our freedom.

Massachusetts bugler & State Director, John Collins receives Achievement Medal for sounding Taps at more than 1000 Army services. This was honored to him at the Massachusetts State House in Boston on Veteran's Day 2011.

John is the only one there dressed in a Coast Guard uniform. The rest are from the 54th Honor Guard Regiment, Massachusetts National Guard. Some are re-enactors in the uniform of the 54th in the Civil War. The 54th then was an all black outfit.





Alabama's Bill Rigby, who has been active in Guantanamo Bay, recently took on a special, personal assignment.

CDR Chuck Dohery and Bill served on active duty together and for the same company. In October while in Iraq, Chuck died of a heart attack. Bill flew to Germany and escorted Chuck home to Texas. On October 17th, Bill sounded Taps for his friend.

BEHIND THE BUGLE - YOUR STORIES

The Vietnam Wall – A Promise Kept by Kevin Hussey Sr.

I quit smoking in 1993 at 48 years old. I smoked 3 packs a day for 30 years. I started packing on the weight. A friend of mine where I worked was a marathon runner. He saw me on the treadmill at work one day and asked me if I would like to run the Marine Corp marathon with him. I told him I couldn't run 26 miles. I told him at had a buddy KIA in 1968 in Vietnam. He told me a lot of people run the marathon and dedicate it to people who were KIA in Vietnam. The seed was planted. I started training and ran the Vermont marathon in May. I then ran the Marine Corp the following October.

I ran a total of ten marathons in 4 years. In 2007 my left knee gave out. I had total knee replacement, but it didn't go as planned. I had to leave work and wait the pain out.



When I couldn't run anymore I decided to learn to play Taps on the trumpet. Well 3 years ago I decided to try and walk the Marine marathon again and dedicate it to my buddy and all those on the Wall.

I even had a tee- shirt signed by all the Marines who served with him in Nam. They

were having their reunion and they signed it for me. My plan was to walk the Marine Corp marathon. Play Taps at the Wall and leave the shirt there. I tried for 2 years but my knees couldn't do it.



I felt I had made a promise to the Marines of the 3/27th and Paul (my buddy) and I had to fulfill it. My friend Dick Higgins is a Vietnam and Vet and told me he would go with me to Washington. We left on Sunday morning and you can see by the pictures My Promise Was Kept. It was very tough on both of us, and was deeply glad he was with me. I myself am not a Vet but I did what I had to do and did it. A lesson on life from this -- you can serve now --and playing Taps is one of them.



I have been the official town bugler and member of the American Legion Honor Guard for the last 47 years. For the past two years I have arranged for "Keep The Spirit of 45 Alive" programs here in McHenry. 45 Flags surrounded the park, each held up by a relative of a WWII vet. The first year I had 19 WWII vets on stage with about 120 people attending. This year I held the event on August 13 with 44 WWII vets on stage and just under 600 people in attendance. I had a good turnout of 19 buglers this year.

BRASS FROM THE PAST

Why the name Taps? by Jari Villanueva

Taps is the name of the final call of the evening in the United States military. The call is sounded at an interval after Tattoo. There are a few explanations for the name of Taps. It is not an acronym, although there are two organizations that exist using the acronym. T.A.P.S.-Tragedy Assistance Program and TAPS-The Atlantic Paranormal Society.



One explanation is that Taps is derived from the Dutch word Tap-toe or Tattoo. The call of Tattoo was used in order to assemble soldiers for the last roll call of the day. Tattoo may have originated during the Thirty Years War (1618-1648) or during the wars of King William III during the 1690s. The word tattoo in this usage is derived from the Dutch tap (tap or faucet) and toe (to cut off). When it was time to cease drinking for the evening and return to the post, the provost or Officer of the Day, accompanied by a sergeant and drummer, would go through the town beating out the signal. As far as military regulations went, there was a prescribed roll call to be taken "at Taptoe time" to ensure that all the troops had returned to their billets. It is possible that the word Tattoo became Taps. Tattoo was also called Tap-toe and as is true with slang terms in the military, it was shortened to Taps.

The other, and more likely, explanation is that the name Taps was borrowed from a drummer's beat. The beating of Tattoo by the drum corps would be followed by the Drummer of the Guard beating three distinct drum taps at four count intervals for the military evolution Extinguish Lights. During the American Civil War, Extinguish Lights was the bugle call used as the final call of the day and as the name implies, it was a signal to extinguish all fires and lights. Following the call, three single drum strokes were beat at four-count intervals. This was known as the "Drum Taps" or in common usage of soldiers "The Taps" or "Taps." There are many references to the term "Taps" before the war and during the conflict, before the bugle call we are all familiar with came into existence. So the drum beat that followed Extinguish Lights came to be called "Taps" by the common soldiers and when the new bugle call was created in July 1862 to replace the more formal



sounding Extinguish Lights, (the one Butterfield disliked), the bugle call also came to be known as "Taps."

Berg Believes All Vets Deserve A Bugler

For some people playing an instrument in front of an audience is unthinkable, but for Derek Berg it is a regular occurrence, and he is honored to do so.

Berg has been playing the trumpet for the Rushford American Legion since 1977 and

has played at over 100 events. "I didn't serve in the Military so I try and serve those who did."

Berg has found an old bugle used by a relative in 1917 and is hoping to restore it. Ideally he would love to use it for taps but it is just a matter of fixing it up.

Berg adds, "I was at a military honors funeral in Winona and they had a tape recorder that played taps. The honor and dignity was not there" seeing and hearing this Berg joined the Buglers Across America (BAA) so he could provide the genuine article. He has now been participating in BAA events for two years.

BAA was founded by Tom Day of Illinois in 2000.

It was formed because Congress said veterans had a right to have two uniformed people fold a flag and a CD player to play taps on. BAA wanted to make sure there would be the opportunity for the veterans to have a real bugler or trumpet player at

Eleven years later, BAA has over 8,000 volunteer buglers across the United States. Of which 121 are in Minnesota.

The BAA is a non-profit organization but will except donations. "We believe every veteran deserves a real bugler at a funeral ceremony."

There are some clothing regulations. If buglers are in the military they may wear their uniform, boy scouts may wear their uniform, or if nothing else is available dark slacks and white shirt.

Players may perform on a bugle, trumpet, cornet, or even a flugelhorn.

A bugler can be either male or female, of any age, and can play on a valve or no valve bugle, trumpet, cornet, or even a flugelhorn. They are required to play taps with style that will bring honor to the veterans and their families.

Berg was named the Minnesota State Director in June of this year. "We hadn't had a State Director for about three years," said Berg.

One of Berg's jobs as a director is finding other buglers. Berg has a map of MN and puts a dot where each bugler lives. Berg says, "There are a couple of bare spots in our state" and he wants to start filling in those areas. "I will start with music colleges and just start sending out some letters." This will make it easier to fulfill all the requests,

When someone request a bugle to be at a service, an email is sent out to all the BAA volunteers within a 100 mile radius. Though with some of the bare spots we have in Minn. this gets tricky.

August 14th is "The Spirit of '45 Day." "This is a day commemorating our greatest generation, the end of World War II." Berg is trying to start a rolling taps at the Fort Snelling Cemetery. Rolling taps is when a group of buglers stand in a circle and play taps as around. "We owe a lot to that generation," and Berg wants to do everything he can to honor them.

"We are truly blessed in this country."

On December 8th News Corp. asked Bugles Across America to honor those who have served at their annual ACP holiday party, held at Fox News' Studio J in New York City. BAA New York State Director Danielle Masterson-Kaelin and bugler Peter Ekstrom attended the event. Not only did Danielle attend the event but she played a large role in planning the event with Fox. Danielle set the flags of our 5 armed services as well as a special "Taps 150" flag provided by BAA, and Peter started the festivities with a bugle call. Patriot Brass also played a selection of holiday favorites for party goers.

Danielle and Peter mingled with many Fox personalities such as Sean Hannity as well as veterans who served in Iraq and Afghanistan, along with their ACP mentors. ACP, American Corporate Partners, provides mentors for service personnel returning home. These mentors helps them apply the skills they acquired in the military to achieve success in business. KEY NOTES

How To Accept A Bugler Request

When a request comes in for a bugler, it is automatically sent out to all buglers within a 100 mile radius of the event.

If you think you may be able to play this request, *PLEASE* look it over carefully. Check the dates, location and time. Now look at your schedule and verify that you are available to play.

If you can play the request, please click "Click here to see more details about this request" at the bottom of the email and that will take you to the the BAA web site. There you can sign in and officially volunteer for the event.

If you are unable to volunteer for the event, feel free to hit the Delete key. The email was automated. There is no need to reply back why you can't volunteer for that mission.

If it has already been accepted by another bugler, you will be told so. If you are the first bugler to volunteer, you will be sent an email with the details of the event.

If you are unsure if you are the bugler that has the mission, click on the "My Events" tab at the top. A new page will open up and show you what you are signed up for.

You've Accepted a Request.. Now What?

Once you have successfully signed up for it, a confirmation email will be sent to the requestor. Please contact the requestor as soon as possible to introduce yourself, reassure that you'll be there and to also get any more information you might need about the event.

When attending an event, please show up at least 45 minutes early and let the funeral director, event coordinator or family member know you are there. Also, bring a copy of the request with you. Why? There may be a military unit there to fold and present the flag. They may have also brought a person to lip sync on a digital device. Your request is from the family and it is your duty to sound Taps. Then, work the schedule of events out with the military person in charge and do your usual great job.

Dress and act professional (obviously) and it's our job to be heard, but not be center stage if you know what I mean.

We perform Taps as a volunteer and do not ask for pay. However, if a family member comes up, shakes your hand and puts a token of gratitude in your hand, PLEASE take it and say Thanks, it was an honor. They feel great and actually so do you.

ANNOUNCING A NEW FEATURE ON THE BAA SITE

Contacting Your State Director!

We have now developed a convenient way for all BAA members to make contact with their State Director, even if they don't know who that might be. The feature is a tab found on the BAA page titled 'Contact Directors'. This will be found as a dropdown under the Contact Us tab, but will be accessible <u>only</u> to registered BAA members that are <u>logged on</u> to the site.

Here's how it works. The registered member (Bugler or Non-bugler) must log on to the site and then if they place their cursor on the Contact Us tab, they will see a Contact Directors tab available. Click that tab, and then the first action is to select a state from a dropdown menu. A few seconds later, a new choice option appears showing the listed Director for the chosen state. If more than one name is listed (Director and Assistants), yet another dropdown appears that shows all the listed directors, by name only. Each state menu also has a generic listing of National Admin. This is important for reasons I will explain later.

After the member has selected a state and a director, they will be required to enter their name and a valid e-mail address. Then they simply type in the message block, and when finished they click the 'submit' button. The screen will change to one that acknowledges the transmission of their message. It also asks that they allow at least three days for a reply, but if their issue is one that cannot tolerate delay, they should also send their message to National Admin. The content of that page is also sent to them as a message to their e-mail address that was provided.

The message is sent to the intended Director. At this point it is the responsibility of the Director to respond to the comment, question or concern of the BAA member. When the Director responds, their contact information will then be viewable to the BAA member. Unless the Director, for some unusual reason, takes measures to hide this information, this is the only time the member will see that. In other words, the messages sent through this link will be to a "name" only.

As mentioned earlier, each state listing of directors also contains a generic National Admin choice. For any state that presently does not have a currently active State Director, this is the only choice available on that list. The other reason for showing National Admin there is to cover the situation stated previously of the member resubmitting their message if they do not receive timely or satisfactory response from the listed State Director.


